Building a good descriptive sentence in Spanish requires one major guideline:



What kind goes behind

Any description that tells "what kind" will be placed **behind** the thing it's describing in a sentence.

Here are some examples:

- a talented musician (talented tells what kind of musician): un músico talentoso
- a tall athlete (tall tells what kind of athlete): un deportista alto
- some green shoes (green tells what kind of shoes): unos zapatos verdes
- a blue & white shirt (blue & white tells what kind of shirt): una camisa blanca y azul
- my favorite jeans (favorite tells what kind of jeans): mis jeans favoritos

*This guideline works for almost any description in Spanish--
any word that tells what kind will go behind. (Yes, it's backwards from English).*

Here's some sentence starters for you:

- Compré... en ... (I bought ... in ...)
- Pagué ... euro por ... (I paid ... Euro for ...)
